HISTORIC LISTED BUILDING GIVEN NEW LEASE OF LIFE

Harwell's historic Cherry Barns have been restored to their former glory, and brought up to date for office accommodation, by developers, Fellside Estates.

The oldest part of Cherry Barns dates back to 1340, and the building was used to house the local cherry harvest.

The building was originally converted to offices in the late 1980's, and has been used by a local architectural practise. Fellside Estates purchased Cherry Barns last year, and have undertaken a thorough refurbishment, including overhauling the thatch, and integrating modern technology into this extraordinary building.

'It is our aim at Fellside Estates to retain a building's historical identity, whilst providing the high standard of internal fitting and facilities required by today's occupiers', comments Neil Mason of Fellside Estates. 'We have taken time to research the building's history, and source bespoke fittings to fit unobtrusively into the building. The new lights are a good example, which were set at a height to sit between the roof beams, and required a very patient and understanding electrician to fit them.'

The building is now available to let, and provides 344.66 sq m (3,710 sq ft).
